

# PERSONA POEMS: WRITING THE DRAFT LOTTERY

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#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

5 minutes

- Recruitment for the Vietnam War was based on “Selective Service,” or a draft lottery. Each birthday was assigned a random number. Numbers that were drawn and all numbers lower would have to report to physical exams immediately. For example, if the number 50 was drawn, all people with a birthday corresponding to the number 50 and below would be drafted.
- The highest draft number ever drawn was 215 in 1972. Therefore, anyone with a number above 215 was safe from the draft.
- Men between the ages of 18 and 25 were eligible for the draft
- Most people drafted were poor or working-class because they were less likely to obtain deferments.

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#### INTRODUCTION

10 minutes

- Take a look at the chart below. Find your birthday and your corresponding draft number.
- Discuss who would have been drafted and who would have avoided the draft. How do you feel about your number?
- What would you do if someone you knew had been drafted and you hadn't?

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**READ THE  
EXCERPT OF “THE  
JOURNALIST” BY AI**

10 minutes

- Ai is a mixed-race woman of color who is known for writing *persona poems*. A *persona poem* is a poem in which the writer embodies the voice and perspective of a different person. The speaker of that poem becomes that person. Another word for a *persona poem* is a *dramatic monologue*.
- How does Ai create the character of the journalist in this poem? What details develop the character?
- What do you think is the purpose of writing a poem from a perspective other than your own?

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**WRITE**

20 minutes

- Using the draft lottery numbers, write a *persona poem* embodying a person who has been affected by the draft.
- You might choose to use the number corresponding to your birthday to influence your poem, or you might choose to use a different number.
- Consider also the lives of women, children, and parents who had to stay home and watch loved ones leave—and sometimes never come back.
- Use the tools Ai used in her poem to create a character and establish an emotional experience.

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**SHARE**

15 minutes

- Have students share the poems they wrote.

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### EXCERPT OF “THE JOURNALIST”

BY AI,  
FROM *VICE: NEW  
AND SELECTED  
POEMS*

In Viet Nam in 1966,  
I stood among the gathering crowd,  
as the Buddhist nun  
doused her robe with gasoline.  
As an American, I couldn't understand  
and as I stood there,  
I imagined myself  
moving through the crowd  
to stop her, but I didn't.  
I held my camera in position.  
Then it happened so quickly—  
her assistant stepped forward  
with a match.  
Flames rose up the nun's robe  
and covered her face,  
then her charred body  
slowly fell to the ground.  
That year in Viet Nam,  
I threw my life in the air  
like a silver baton.  
I could catch it with my eyes closed.  
Til one night,  
it sailed into black space like a wish  
and disappeared.  
Or was it me who vanished,  
sucking the hard, rock candy  
of the future,  
sure that a man's life is art,  
that mine had to be?

But tonight, I'm fifty-three.  
I've drunk my way to the bottom  
of that river of my youth  
and I'm lying there  
like a fat carp,  
belly-down in the muck.  
And nothing, not the blonde,  
the red car,  
or the smell of new money  
can get me up again.
